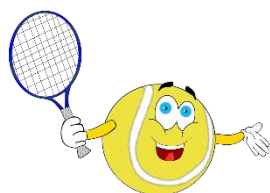

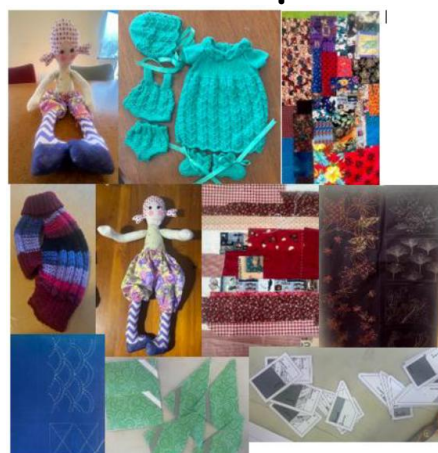

## Henty Camera Club Celebrating 70 years

Being one of the longest continually operating photography clubs in Australia, the Henty Camera Club are celebrating 70 years of continuous activities and support for photographers.

The inaugural meeting was held on 29<sup>th</sup> June 1956 with the first AGM being held in April 1957. The first in club competition was held in August 1961 using the most advanced photography technology of the day being colour transparencies, known as slides.

Guest speakers have been a feature of Henty Camera Club meetings over the years, as has been the club’s popular field trips.

Henty Camera Club has also hosted the photography section at the Henty Show since the 1960’s with entries numbering as high as 350 over various sections.

Over the past 70 years, the club has weathered economic downturns, droughts, floods, the sale of its meeting venue, the passing of members, rural de-population and COVID. Despite all this, the Club still meets monthly to share the love of photography, to learn, grow and maintain social contact.

## **Techno Info**

Scams have always been around, but the ones targeting Australians right now are more convincing than ever — and increasingly, some are being supercharged by AI (Artificial Intelligence). This month's we'll run through some of the common scams that are happening and a habit that protects you against almost all of it, and where to check if something feels off.

Imagine your phone rings. It's your daughter's voice panicked. "Mum, I've been in an accident, please don't tell anyone, I need money right now."; Except your daughter is safely at home. The voice on the phone was never her at all.

This is happening in Australia right now. Scammers can clone someone's voice using just a few seconds of audio — pulled from a Facebook video, a voicemail greeting, anything public. It sounds exactly like the real person. No robotic tone, no giveaway. It's frightening, and it's worth knowing about. And there are the scams that are far more common...

### **Government impersonation calls:**

Someone calls claiming to be from the ATO, Centrelink, myGov, or even the Australian Federal Police. They might say there's a warrant out for your arrest, a parcel with your passport was found as part of an investigation, or you owe an unpaid fine. This exact scam has caught people in our own community by surprise — the calls can sound very official and use real government names.

### **The truth:**

Government departments do not call out of nowhere demanding payment or personal details. They will never ask you to pay using gift cards, cryptocurrency, or a wire transfer. If in doubt, hang up and call the department back using the number on their official website — not a number the caller gives you.

### **Bank impersonation:**

A call or text claims to be your bank, warning of "suspicious activity" and asking you to confirm your details or transfer money to a "safe account" There is no such thing as a safe account — this is always a scam. Your real bank will never ask you to transfer your own money anywhere to protect it.

### **Gift card and voucher scams:**

If anyone — a caller, a "family member" in a text, a supposed government official — asks you to pay using iTunes, Google Play, or other gift cards, it is a scam, every single time. No legitimate organisation asks for payment this way.

### **The AI voice-clone family emergency:**

As described above — a caller sounds exactly like a loved one, often with background noise or an excuse for sounding different, urgently needing money and asking you to keep it secret. This is also done via a WhatsApp message or text messages — my Mum had this happen to her a few years ago and was tricked out of thousands of dollars!

### **The one trick that stops all of it:**

Whatever the scam, whatever the story, the advice is the same:

**Never act in the moment. Always verify independently.**

- If it's a bank, hang up and call the number on the back of your card
- If it's "the government," hang up and call the department using the number from their official website
- If it's a family member in trouble, hang up and call them back directly on their known number
- Never transfer money, buy gift cards, or give personal details to someone who called you.

### **For families — agree on a safe word:**

Choose a private word or phrase that only your household knows — something that would never appear on social media. If anyone calls claiming to be a family member in an emergency, ask for the safe word before doing anything. A scammer with a cloned voice cannot know it.

Secrecy is always a red flag. If a caller tells you to keep this "between us" or not to tell anyone else in the family — that alone should tell you something is wrong.

### **Where to check and report:**

The Australian Government's official scam awareness site is **Scamwatch**, run by the National Anti-Scam Centre. You can check current scam alerts, look up known scam numbers, and report anything suspicious at: [www.scamwatch.gov.au](http://www.scamwatch.gov.au)

If you or someone you know has already sent money or shared details, contact your bank immediately and report it through Scamwatch — the faster you act, the better the chance of stopping it.

### **Tech Tip — Time to stop reusing your password:**

If you're using the same password for your email, your banking, and Facebook — you need to take action.

Here's why it matters: if one of those websites has a data breach (and many have, without you even knowing), scammers get your password and immediately try it everywhere else. One leaked password can open every door.

#### **The fix: a password manager:**

A password manager is an app that creates and remembers strong, unique passwords for every website — so you only need to remember one master password yourself.

A few well-regarded options, depending on what you use:

- Built into your phone already — iPhones have this built in via Settings → Passwords. Android and Chrome have Google Password Manager built in too. Free, and you may already be using it without realising.
- Bitwarden — free, works across phone and computer, well regarded for ease of use.
- 1Password — paid, very polished, popular with families who want to share passwords securely.

You don't need anything fancy — even just using the password manager already built into your phone is a big step up from writing passwords in a notebook or reusing “Fluffy1234!” everywhere.

Combined with the two-factor authentication we covered a couple of months back, a password manager rounds out the basics of keeping your accounts secure.

## *Hills History*

### **“Through the Bush and Scrub”**

#### Part 2

Pastor Fischer started teaching about 1889 in the vestry of the church – for a while it was fine, but in April of 1891 a state school opened up, in a little timber building, once a boundary riders hut.

Dismantled and then loaded on a local farmer's dray, from Fig Tree corner it was carted – across the baked red clay.

Miss Westerndorf was the first teacher, in that little wooded school, and no doubt (as was the fashion) she maintained an iron rule.

The early family names in the old enrolment book are still well known in the district – if you pause to take a look.

Chris and Lizzie Pumpa, and from the Scheuner family, three – Paul, Julius and Adolf – good ethnic names you see!

When school picnic days arrived, they began with the greatest sound, the brass band playing loudly led the children to the ground.

The first of these recorded, was in 1894. And men showed off their muscles when they had a tug-o-war.

The picnics were so popular, all came who had the chance, and children ran in races – then performed a maypole dance.

The school was closed when measles struck in August of 1898, and kids who escaped the sickness thought their holiday really great.

A new teacher came along – his name was Herb Fitzelle, and children under his tutorage did their work exceedingly well.

Now one family in the district with pride was aglow, when their child won first prize for writing, at the Albury Agriculture Show.

With more people in the district, a school for fifty was built, and the water dam was constructed, and was kept clean, and free of silt.

A teacher's house came next, its appearance was quite fine, and the mentor took up residence in 1899.

Still more settlers came to “Pleasant Hills”, and really very soon there were so many students, they needed another room!

The climate was usually reliable, but 1902 there was a terrible drought, some years saw flames from fierce bushfires, which only rain could put out. *(From: “Under the Fig Tree”, pg 47 & 49).*

## Our Backyard

### HARVESTERS

When one looks back into our history, it is interest to notice how many things were discovered long ago, only to be lost in time and sometimes be 're-discovered', sometimes many centuries later. In the book 'Great Inventions Through History' by Gerald Messadie, it becomes evident that the 're-discovery' of so many concepts fit this bill. There are also those that were envisaged on paper but needed the technology to develop to bring them to fruition. Most of us would be aware of the inventions of Leonardo da Vinci (helicopters and submarines); but there is a plethora of others.

The concept of 'harvesters' is one example.

"One of the peculiarities of agricultural technology is that the harvester, which appeared at a very early date in history, fell into disuse, not to be 're-discovered' until the 19<sup>th</sup> century. Pliny the Elder, who lived in the 1<sup>st</sup> century, describes a Celtic cart equipped with a toothed blade and pushed by a draught animal. This would have been used in Gaul to reap the ears and the straw. The machine survived for four centuries but apparently only in the Celtic region of Gaul; perhaps it was not to be to the liking of farmers. The harvester was 're-invented' in the first years of the 19<sup>th</sup> century".

It took 100 odd years though for the harvester to develop into a reliable commodity. This of course that most you know was achieved by a man who was born just down the road from here – Headlie Taylor. A museum to

recognise his achievements can be found on the highway in Henty.

The Celts are a memorable bunch, which many you might not know, are your long-lost ancestors. Their empire stretched across Europe from Greece to England and Ireland with many people speaking some dialect of theirs. Their civilisation mysteriously vanished and although we have many material examples of their achievements, not much has remained about the structure of their society.

Stonehenge is an example of a Celtic structure that we still fully don't understand except that it has some astrological connections and is accepted as: 'The Home of The Druids'. John Davies in his book "The Celts", seems to think 'that the druid's role was political rather than priestly. The Romans, generally tolerant of the religious practices of the people they conquered, were determined to stamp out druidism, presumably because they saw it as central to Celtic resistance to their rule'. Maybe that's what happened.

## **Matt's Cooking Corner:**



### Grandpas Chicken risoni and spinach soup



#### Ingredients:

- 1 onion, roughly chopped
- 1 stick celery, roughly chopped
- 1 carrot, roughly chopped
- 1 bay leaf
- 6 peppercorns
- 4 cups (1L) chicken liquid stock
- 3 cups (750ml) water
- 2/3 cup risoni pasta
- 2 single chicken breast fillets, thinly sliced, excess fat trimmed
- 1 1/2 cups baby spinach leaves
- Himalayan rock salt and cracked black pepper

#### Method:

- Place the onion, celery, carrot, bay leaf and peppercorns in a large saucepan over medium heat. Add stock and water and bring to the boil. Reduce the heat, cover and simmer for 45 minutes then remove from stovetop and strain, reserving the liquid.
- Return liquid to the pan over medium heat. Add the risoni and simmer for 4 minutes. Add the chicken and cook for another 3-4 minutes. Add the spinach and cook for another 3-4 minutes or until spinach has wilted.
- Season with salt and pepper. Ladle soup between serving bowls and serve immediately.

#### Note:

Risoni, also known as orzo, is a type of short-cut pasta that resembles large grains of rice. It is versatile and can be used in various dishes, including soups, salads, and one-pot meals.
