## Our Backyard

### Where Have All The Wallaroo's Gone?

A couple of weeks ago we had a couple of visitors from 'out west'. This presumably Red Kangaroo and her joey came to Pleasant Hills no doubt looking for food and a good drink during tough times. I haven't seen her about for a while so I gather she has moved on or least gone back to her native territory but you never know. Keep an eye out for them when driving or walking around the village and you may see them.

Red Kangaroos, although not uncommon are usually not found this far east. It is the largest living marsupial, with proportionally the longest hindlegs. Females are usually about half the weight of the males so you can imagine what the size of a mature male would be. It hops with the body horizontal, tail held in a shallow 'U' shape. It has a loud cough alarm call and makes 'clucking' sounds. Provision of bore water for stock has allowed populations in arid country to expand. This skill gives rise to the ability to travel far from home during drought conditions, she knew where the water was, not looking for rivers but water storage areas to keep her and her joey on the move. Single young vacate the pouch at about 9 months, independent at 12 months and this young joey looked exactly like mum (not photographed).

The Wiradjuri for a female Red Kangaroo is 'bandhaa'.

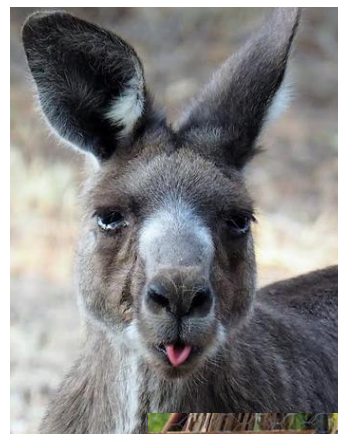
I originally thought this species was a Wallaroo. But the 'Euro' is stockier and has shaggier fur. It doesn't need to drink but has the ability of obtaining water from the food it eats. Species are allegedly widespread across Australia. I believe the

word Kangaroo' is an Aboriginal word collected by James Cook from Queensland but the word 'Wallaroo' (walarru) is a local Wiradjuri word first collected by Tibbets in 1900. Although the Common Wallaroo is a protected species, permits may be granted by State wildlife authorities to reduce numbers in prescribed areas. Come think of it, after many years of hiking and canoeing across this vast country, I can't ever remember seeing a Wallaroo in the wild. It makes one think that they aren't as prolific as they are made out to be.

## **Matt's Cooking Corner:**



### **Grandpas Broccoli Cheddar Soup**

#### **Ingredients:**

- 4 tablespoons butter
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- ½ teaspoon Himalayan rock salt
- Freshly ground black pepper
- 3 cloves of chopped garlic
- ¼ cup plain flour
- 2 cups whole milk or almond milk
- 2 cups vegetable stock (or chicken stock)
- 3 cups chopped broccoli florets
- 1 large carrot, julienned or finely chopped
- ½ teaspoon Dijon mustard
- 250 grams shredded cheddar cheese, about 2 heaping cups
- handful of homemade croutons for serving, optional

#### **Method:**

- Melt the butter in a large pot or Dutch oven over medium heat. Add the onion, salt, and several grinds of pepper and cook, stirring, for 5 minutes, or until softened. Stir in the garlic and cook for another minute, then sprinkle in the flour and whisk continuously for 1 to 2 minutes, or until the flour turns golden. Slowly pour in the milk, whisking continuously.
- Add the broth, broccoli, carrot, and mustard and stir to combine. Simmer



for 15 to 20 minutes, or until the broccoli is tender.

- Gradually add the cheese, stirring after each addition, until all the cheese is melted and the soup is creamy. Season to taste and serve with croutons, if desired.

#### **Note:**

For an extra smoky twist, try frying some bacon till crispy and crumble it over the top.

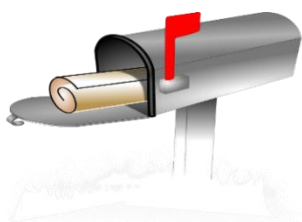
